## The Many Benefits of Natural Shorelines

**Why 'go natural'?** Many of the things that we love about lakefront living depend on natural shoreline vegetation. A more natural shoreline (including some woody debris at the water's edge) provides habitat for turtles, fish, birds and other wildlife and importantly helps reduce nutrient and herbicide runoff into the lake. Another big benefit of not mowing to the water's edge is that it makes your lawn less attractive to Canada Geese who like a clear line of sight to the water!

**How do I protect my shoreline and 'go natural'?** The simplest way to start is to define an area along the shoreline, stop mowing and let 'mother nature' do the work. It may be a bit weedy at first, but you can supplement what comes in naturally with native plants, shrubs and trees that tolerate wet conditions. A list of native shoreline plants can be found at Michigan Shoreline Partnership.org. The photo on the first page shows an example of such a "low budget" approach to a natural shoreline at our house on Little Long Lake.

Areas subject to lots of wind and wave action may require the installation of erosion control blankets to be stabilized and then planted. Erosion control blankets made of jute or wood fiber are often used in natural shoreline projects. You can also install a rock wall along the shoreline and then plant among and around the rocks. The rocks will eventually become hidden by vegetation, creating an aesthetically pleasing shoreline that provides erosion control.

## Summer 2022 News from the Gull Lake Boatwash

Our Boatwashing Station at Prairieville Township Park is in its sixth year of operation and is going strong. Several of our staff members have returned for the summer and are busy washing the boats on weekends in their never-ending and valiant efforts to slow the spread of aquatic invasives in and out of Gull Lake.

This year there have been more questions from patrons regarding the legitimate threat of non-native wildlife and the purpose of the boat wash. We see these inquiries in two lights:

1. The fact that the general public is unaware of what a body of water would look like with unchecked invasives tells us that we are doing a great job and having an impact on the lake itself.
- 2: This creates a wonderful opportunity to enhance our Environmental Education skills, to practice broader outreach about watershed health in general, and inspire more interest and appreciation for native wildlife that is right here, in Gull Lake and the encompassing watershed.

As another project aimed at inviting more inquiry and participation in the health and quality of our watershed we have started a "Water Wildlife Viewing Station" at our Boatwash. We have an aquarium set up with native Gull Lake plants (including a carnivorous one!), a microscope for macroinvertebrates, a spotting scope for watching birds and boats, as well as a few turtle shells and native terrestrial plants for hands-on learning. The informational signs will provide a more self-guided experience while the staff is occupied with washing the boats. Visitors are encouraged to use our high-powered Bushnell scope for looking out over the lake, to ask questions, and take out a few aquatic plants from the aquarium to look at

under the microscope. In turn, we hope this will be a more direct and experiential response to the common question at the Boatwash, "Are any weeds in the lake actually good?" Short answer - Yes. For the visual learner we have a few examples at the viewing station. To the more literary among us I'd like to quote Emerson when he defined "a weed" as simply "a plant whose virtues have yet to be discovered."

## Update on the Control of Invasive Aquatic Plants in Gull Lake Summer 2022

Treatment for two invasive plant species found in Gull Lake, **Starry Stonewort** and **non-native Milfoil**, continued in Summer 2022. While neither of these invasive plants can be completely eradicated, they can be limited in growth and spread through targeted treatments. The Gull Lake Quality Organization hires and works with a consultant firm (Progressive AE) to survey aquatic plants in Gull Lake and oversee treatment applications by a third-party treatment contractor (PLM Lake and Land Management).

A whole-lake survey conducted in 2021 identified three areas where invasive aquatic plants are found in Gull Lake:

1. Approximately 1.5 acres of Starry Stonewort near the Prairieville boat launch
2. Approximately 3 acres of Starry Stonewort along West Gull Lake Drive north of the Country Club
3. Approximately 2 acres of non-native Milfoil along the channel outlet that feeds into Augusta Creek.

Starry Stonewort was treated in June 2022 with a product called “Clipper” in two areas; near the Prairieville boat launch and north of the Country Club. A third area immediately adjacent to the Country Club boat launch was treated for non-native Milfoil in June using a product called “ProcellaCOR”.

The products used to treat these invasive aquatic plants are safe to people, fish and wildlife when applied properly. There are, however, some recommended precautions. They are generally applied directly to the water surface or injected just under the surface. The “Clipper” algaecide treatment for Starry Stonewort recommends not swimming or bathing in the water for one-day after treatment and not using treated water for lawn irrigation for three days after treatment. The “ProcellaCOR” treatment for Milfoil has the same one-day swimming recommendation, but no restrictions for established turf/grasses. Our treatment application contractor (PLM) has told us that they have never seen or heard of any damage or negative affects to lawns or landscaping from irrigation for any of the products they currently use.

A limited Starry Stonewort treatment also was conducted during the week of July 25<sup>th</sup> near the Country Club boat launch and a broader treatment is being planned for August, tentatively the week of August 15<sup>th</sup>. ## Buoy Control on Gull Lake

Some Gull Lake residents have reached out to the townships and to GLQO board members on the rules and enforcement of buoy placement. Some are concerned with the sheer number of buoys being placed in Gull Lake and others are concerned that they may be ticketed for installing them. According to Sgt. Christopher Holmes from the DNR, the DNR has seen an increase in complaints regarding illegal buoys and docks/rafts over the past two years. Currently the DNR officers are trying to educate the public on the laws regarding buoy and

dock/raft placement, rather than taking enforcement action. The DNR, however, commented that if the issues of illegal buoys and docks persist on the lake, enforcement action will be taken.

Most of the buoys/markers anchored around the shore are of the type known as “Norwegian” buoys (see photos). “Norwegian” buoys are not appropriate markers for swimming areas or navigation per the uniform waterway marking system.

Language specifying the placement of lake buoys is contained in the State Laws of Michigan under the statute on buoys and rafts - **324.80163** and **324.80159**. Interested readers can find a copy of these statutes on the GLQO website (<https://glqo.net/2022/08/michigan-dnr-regulations-regarding-buoys/>). **The DNR encourages the public to read the statues as written and contact the nearest MDNR Operations Center with any questions.** If someone wants to apply for a Buoy permit, they can do so through the DNR Plainwell Customer Service Center 269-685-6851.

The likely reason many of the buoys on Gull Lake have been installed over the past few years is concern by waterfront property owners over watercraft coming too close to swimming areas/docks/moored vessels. Boaters must comply with the 100 foot rule: **A person shall maintain a distance of 100 ft. from any dock, boat, raft, buoyed or occupied bathing area while driving at other than slow – no wake speed.** When this simple rule is followed, markers can be eliminated in most cases.
